



BERWICK SEAVIEW CYCLE ROUTE

This 12.5 mile route (one way) takes you from Spittal to Holy Island, which lies just a few miles off the Northumberland Coast. Holy Island has a wealth of fascinating history and provides stunning coastal views.

SURFACES

Can be rough in places.

TRAFFIC 🚓 🚓 🚓

A mixture of on road and traffic free paths. Take care crossing the railway line.

SUITABILITY FOR YOUNG CHILDREN 🗙

No, but older children would be OK with supervision.



REFRESHMENTS/FACILITIES

The Barn at Beal is a great coffee shop in a spectacular location overlooking Lindisfarne National Nature Reserve. There are plenty of places to eat and drink on Holy Island including The Ship Inn and Pilgrims Coffee House.

OTHER ROUTES IN THE AREA

Using National Route 1 you can continue south along the coastline, travelling past Bamburgh Castle and Dunstanburgh Castle all the way to Alnmouth (34 miles).

Travelling North from Spittal, National Route 1 takes you to Berwick-upon-Tweed and then onto Scotland.



DIRECTIONS

- 1 Turn right out of the site, follow the road round to the right outside the Albion Inn and at the end of the road, up on to the cliff tops.
- 2 Pick up the coastal path along the cliffs to Cheswick. Take care crossing the railway line.
- 3 From here you travel past the Golf course at Goswick and travel on a stony path to the causeway road that takes you to Holy Island.

4 Return by the same route in reverse.

The Castle on Holy Island was built to defend a harbour sheltering English ships during skirmishes with Scotland and you can explore the rooms which remain largely unchanged. Ransacked by marauding Viking raiders in the 8th century, the stunning ruins of Lindisfarne Priory includes the famous 'rainbow bridge' which spirals skywards. The area is a National Nature Reserve and a great place to see wildlife including grey seals and a wide variety of migratory birds.
